

## Oxford Studies of Time in Language and Thought

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This new series identifies and promotes ground-breaking research on the human concept of time and its representation in language. Representing time in language is one of the most debated issues in semantic theory and riddled with unresolved questions, puzzles, and paradoxes. The series will aim to advance the development of satisfactory theories to explain and account for such basic matters as

- representing tenses
- the interaction of the temporal information conveyed by tense, aspect, temporal adverbial and context
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- relations between events and states (eventualities), facts, propositions, sentences, and utterances.

The series also seeks to advance time-related research in such key areas as language modelling in computational linguistics, AI, and the linguistic relativity/universalism debate, as well as in theoretical and applied contrastive studies.

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**Kasia M. Jaszczolt** is Reader in Linguistics and Philosophy of Language at the Department of Linguistics, University of Cambridge, and Fellow of Newnham College, Cambridge. She is the author of a theory of discourse interpretation called Default Semantics. Her books include *Default Semantics* (OUP 2005) and *Representing Time: An Essay on Temporality as Modality* (OUP 2009). From 1996 to 2008 she was general editor of the Elsevier series *Current Research in the Semantics /Pragmatics Interface*.
